Storm Water Fee Increase

At the April 17, 2017 Storm Water Management Board meeting, the board made a motion to recommend to Council to raise the monthly storm water fee from \$5.00 per EDU (equivalent dwelling unit) to \$7.50 per EDU. This motion was presented to the Newburgh Town Council at their May 10, 2017 Council meeting, and Council voted to approve the recommended increase. This increase went into effect on July 1, 2017 and should have been first reflected on your July sewer bill.

A NOTE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER



Dear Friends,

It has been a busy and exciting summer, and as the kiddos head back to school I hope we all take a little extra care making sure they get to and from school safely.

I'd like to take a moment to thank all of you for your support in my role as Town Manager. I greatly appreciate resident and merchant feedback as it is crucial to helping me address issues promptly. If you have a concern, please don't hesitate to contact me directly (812) 853-3578.

And while I'm thanking people, I would like to recognize our incredible staff –Our Police, Fire, Street and Building Maintenance Departments, Administrative, Zoning, Clerk Treasurer's office, Utility billing and Sewer department who are constantly working behind the scenes, in a manhole, a ditch or on the side of the road, rain or shine. Keeping us safe, responding to emergencies and saving lives. The office staff that holds it all together; little blurs of fast fingers and endless paperwork, fielding issues and enforcing ordinances. I could not do my job without each and every one of them.

As we head into fall, there will be several infrastructure improvements happening. Pending partial federal funding, the issues on Washington Street from Jennings Street to Main Street will be addressed. West Main Street will be paved along with the portion of SR 662 that was omitted in the last paving project and French Island Trail will be crack sealed to extend the life of the pavement. In addition, the Newburgh Sewer Department has several projects in the works that will not only increase capacity for new development but correct current issues, for example on Yorkshire. These are necessary for the protection and perpetuation of the system. With the increased storm water fee, the town will be able to complete several drainage projects that have been on the books for some time, including starting the five phase Forest Park drainage project. Please contact me if you have paving, sewer or drainage issues that need to be documented.

The Rivertown Trail extension is back on track and anticipated to break ground in the spring of 2018. The addition will connect to the Aurand Trail Head and continue west to Pollock Avenue. Currently the town is seeking organizations to 'Adopt a Spot' on the trail for general maintenance like litter clean up and yard work. Contact Town Hall if you would like to participate.

We have several upcoming volunteer and fundraising opportunities and I hope you can participate in some small way as we continue to make Newburgh a wonderful place to live, work and visit.

Waste Management

WHAT CANNOT BE RECYCLED

Plastic Grocery Bags

Plastic grocery bags can get caught in the recycle sorter & shut the whole system down.

Take-Out Containers & Donut Boxes

Can only be recycled if free from food residue and food waste.

Pizza Boxes

Grease contaminates the raw material. Tear off the untarnished parts and recycle those.

Styrofoam

Paper Coffee Cups

The plastic coating applied to prevent leaking can pose issues to recycling.

Shredded Paper

Household Glass

Items like window panes, mirrors, light bulbs and dishes are dangerous and should be left out of recycling.

Wet Paper

Can make recycling difficult or impossible.

Milk & Juice Cartons

Coated with a thin layer of wax.

Baby Diapers

Aerosol Cans

Ceramics & Pottery

Paint, Pesticides, Automobile Fluid, Diesel Fuel, Gasoline, Kerosene, Car Batteries, Automotive Parts & Scrap Metals

Hypodermic Needles

LIMB PICKUP

Councilwoman and Street Commissioner Anne Rust Aurand wants to remind everyone that Advanced Disposal will pick up small tree limbs. The tree limbs are not to be over 3" in diameter and bundled in lengths not to exceed 4' and not to exceed 30 pounds. It is also helpful for the tie to be brightly colored so the driver can see that the limbs are properly bundled and not just stacked loosely.

We also ask that any limbs or trees that have fallen into the right of way be reported to Town Hall at 812-853-1720. The Street Department will be notified and those obstructions will be removed promptly to ensure everyone's safety.

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
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HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

RIVERTOWN TRAIL ADOPT-A-SPOT

Councilwoman Leanna K. Hughes and the Rivertown Trail Committee would like to invite you to participate in the new Rivertown Trail Adopt-A-Spot program.



What is Adopt-A-Spot?

A program to assist volunteers in caring for spots along the Rivertown Trail.

Who can Adopt-A-Spot?

The Adopt-A-Spot program was established for community organizations, businesses, schools, civil groups, churches, or families who want to maintain and beautify a particular area on the Rivertown Trail.

Why Participate?

Participating in the Rivertown Trail Adopt-A-Spot will help preserve the trail for future use and help contribute to the beautification of the trail.



When is the adoption period?

The adoption period is open from March through November of each calendar year.

What is the time commitment?

It depends on the size of the spot. A minimum of two visits per month is all that is required.

How do I care for my spot?

Tasks include picking up litter, maintaining current landscaping, planting, weeding and deadheading. Training can be provided.

What will I get for my efforts?

Participants will have their group name listed on the Newburgh News of Note newsletter and on the Town's website (photos of the adopters are encouraged). A sign

will also be placed in your spot to recognize your efforts.

How much does it cost?

Participation is free and the Rivertown Trail Committee will provide the signs. Donations are always welcome.

How do I sign up?

OHIO RIVER SWEEP



The Ohio River Sweep is hosted each year by the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO) and this year the event took place on June 17th. The Town of Newburgh asked volunteers to come out between the hours of 8am to 11am to help pick up debris along the river bank.

Zoning Administrator, Tavi Wydicks assisted the volunteers in signing up while Andrea Balboni, the Administrative Assistant for the Town picked up the trash bags collected by the 42 volunteers.



The volunteers covered approximately 225,000 square feet and collected 53 bags of trash along with a fridge, an orange traffic barrel, buoys and a great deal of large broken debris.



The Town of Newburgh would like to thank the 42 volunteers that came out and helped clean the river bank. The Ohio River Sweep will take place again next year, but ORSANCO has not released the date yet. Follow the Town of Newburgh on Facebook and/or watch for the date in the Spring 2018 newsletter.

OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED



Councilman William F. Kavanaugh would like to remind everyone per Newburgh Code of Ordinances §92.02, no person, firm or corporation shall openly burn any material within the town except as allowed by the following exceptions:

Open burning of wood products, except leaves, shall be allowed for the following:


- Twelfth Night ceremonies
- School pep rallies
- Fires used for cooking purposes
- Riverbank campfires
- Fires used in scouting activities
- Fires for purposes of fire training by a Fire Department
- Riverbank driftwood burning
- Upon permit from the Town Council

Open burning of non-wood products shall only be allowed by permit.

Otherwise non-permitted open burning may be allowed by special permit issued by Town Council upon conditions established by Town Council and payment of a special permit fee.

Town of Newburgh Historic District Expansion




Existing Primary Historic District

The Town of Newburgh Historic Preservation Commission would like to announce that the Newburgh Town Council voted to approve the expansion of the Newburgh Historic District at their February 22, 2017 Town Council meeting. The expansion came to Council as a unanimous recommendation from the Historic Preservation Commission. The Commission wanted to take additional steps to preserve a greater number of historic properties and maintain the historic fabric of the Town, and found that the best way to do so would be to expand the district, which expands the protection of historic Newburgh.

Any structures within the zones designated as historic in the Indiana State Historic Architectural & Archaeological Research Database will need to obtain a Certificate of Appropriateness for any work completed on the exterior of the structure that is visible from the public way. Any structures not designated as historic will have restrictions only related to demolition or moving, and some oversight on new construction.

While we work together to adapt to this change to our historic district, the Historic Preservation Commission and Newburgh Town Council have decided to waive Certificate of Appropriateness fees for any work completed on homes with a historic rating that would require a Certificate of Appropriateness for the remainder of 2017.




North Historic District

The properties do not have to have any historical significance but must be within the corporate limits of Newburgh. The Improvement Recognition Award committee members Anne Rust Aurand and Stacie M. IS YOUR HOUSE NUMBER VISIBLE?

In an emergency, first responders depend on house numbers to find you as quickly as possible. Make sure your house number is clearly marked and visible from the street.

Finding your house, especially at night, can be challenging if address numbers are not visible. Make sure your house number is clearly marked, unblocked, lit and readable.

House numbers should be:

- On a contrasting background
- At least 3" to be seen from the street
- Unobstructed by trees, vehicles or decorations
- Facing the street named in your address
- Displayed at your driveway entrance if your house is not visible from the street

SIGN PERMITS

Councilwoman Tonya McGuire and the Newburgh Plan Commission want to remind everyone per Newburgh Code of Ordinance §157.98 sign permits are required. No person may erect, alter or relocate any banner, wall sign, ground sign, permeant window sign, canopy or awning in the town without first obtaining a permit from the Zoning Administrator and paying the required fee. Ride Solution operates the WATS bus routes that connect with the Evansville METS transportation system. No advance scheduling required. Just get on board at any of the stops.



Outstanding Citizen Award



On July 26, 2017 Dr. James Renne was awarded the 2016 Outstanding Citizen Award for his work with the Little Brick House. Legend has it that the Little Brick House served as a blacksmith's shop, a stage coach delivery point, an ice house and even a mortuary museum. For many years this historic gem was concealed as another larger structure was built around it until it burned in 1986. Currently the Little Brick House is located at 519 West Jennings Street and needs to be moved. It will be repurposed as a featured element at the proposed amphitheater as a ticket booth and concession stand. Dr. Renne has worked to obtain grants, donations and additional funding to save the Little Brick House. EMERALD ASH BORER

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is an exotic beetle that was discovered in southeastern Michigan in the summer of 2002. The EAB larvae feed on the inner bark of ash trees, disrupting the tree's ability to transport water and nutrients. The Town of Newburgh has five ash trees, three of those trees provide shade at our Fortress of Fun. Thanks to donations the town was able to give each of the five ash trees a preventative treatment in 2016.



The ash trees will continually need treatment every two (2) years for 10-12 years to ensure their health
