The Comprehensive Plan was reviewed by the Newburgh Planning Commission at their October 2, 2023 meeting and a recommendation was made to Town Council on the adoption of the plan. The plan will go before Town Council at their October 25, 2023 meeting.

ELECTION DISTRICTS

Per Newburgh Code of Ordinance §33.01, the Town of Newburgh shall have four (4) districts, numbered one through four (4), and one (1) at-large district. The Town Council shall consist of five (5) members who are serving staggered terms pursuant to prior Town ordinances. All members of the Town Council SHALL BE ELECTED BY THE VOTERS OF THE WHOLE TOWN. The members of Town Council representing Districts One (I), Two (II), Three (III), and Four (IV) shall reside in the district from which such Councilperson ran for election and was elected as the representative. The At-Large District Councilperson may reside anywhere in the Town limits. The Clerk-Treasurer may reside anywhere in the Town and shall be elected by the voters of the whole Town.

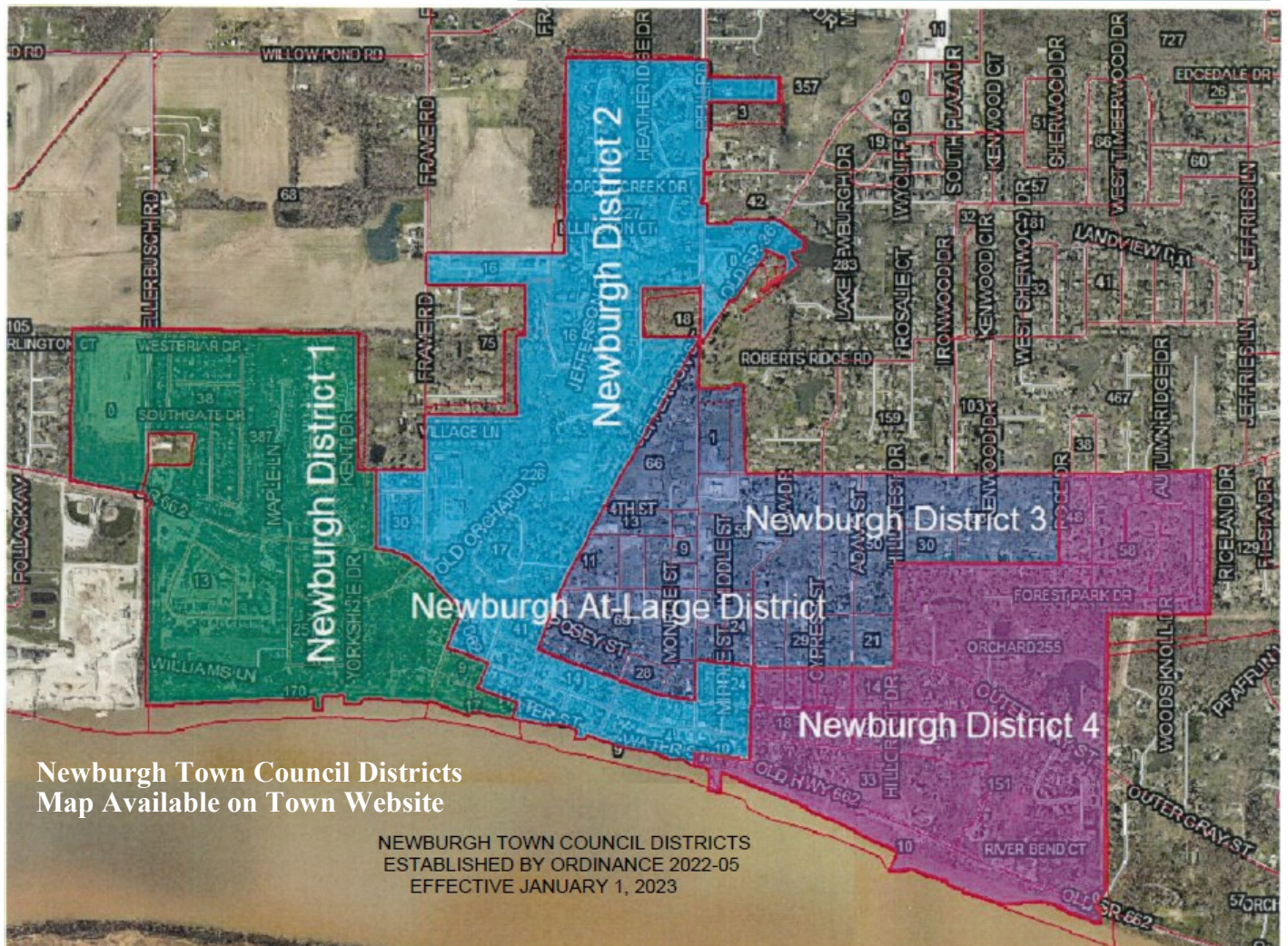

STAFFING UPDATES

Councilwomen and Personnel Committee Members, Anne Rust Aurand and Stacie Krieger would like to announce some staffing updates within the Town.

The previous Zoning Administrator, Tavi Wydicks, after ten (10) years of dedicated service to the Town of Newburgh, moved on to a different role outside of the Town.

The role of Interim Zoning Administrator was given to Kelley Gustafson while our Facilities Coordinator Andrea Balboni took on an additional new role of Historic Preservation Administrator. In addition to the internal staffing changes, a new Civil Town Assistant, Nancy Heald, was hired.

KELLEY GUSTAFSON

Interim Zoning Administrator

Kelley Gustafson moved from Nevada to the Town of Newburgh in 2021. That same year in July, Kelley started as the Civil Town Assistant with the Town of Newburgh. Kelley worked closely with the Facilities Coordinator and the previous Zoning Administrator creating new procedures and helping increase rentals. When the position of Interim Zoning Administrator opened up, Kelley was a natural fit and took the position on May 24, 2023.

As Interim Zoning Administrator Kelley is responsible for zoning, planning, building permits and code enforcement. Kelley will also be working closely with the Town Manager and the Facilities Coordinator on MS4.



ANDREA BALBONI

Facilities Coordinator Historic Preservation Administrator

Andrea Balboni started with the Town of Newburgh on May 25, 2016 as the Administrative Assistant. Before coming to the Town of Newburgh, Andrea worked for Brewster Water and the Sandwich Assessors Office in Massachusetts; gaining over three years of local municipality experience before moving back to Indiana. On March 1, 2019 Andrea was promoted to Facilities Coordinator within the Town of Newburgh. As Facilities Coordinator, Andrea continues administrative work but also oversees all Town owned properties including the Town's seven parks and assists the Town Manager with MS4 requirements.

In May of 2023, Andrea was awarded the role of Historic Preservation Administrator. The HP Administrator works closely with Newburgh's Historic Preservation Commission, reviews all COA requests and works closely with the Interim Zoning Administrator on code enforcement in regard to historic properties.



NANCY HEALD

Civil Town Assistant

Nancy Heald started with the Town of Newburgh on August 8, 2023 as the new Civil Town Assistant. Nancy has thirteen years of local municipality experience working in the Madison County Surveyor's Office.

As the Civil Town Assistant, Nancy's role will be handling facility rentals, working closely with the Facilities Coordinator and the Interim Zoning Administrator. As Nancy gets more comfortable within her role, we are sure to see her take on new tasks and projects.

NEWBURGH'S TOWN MANAGERS

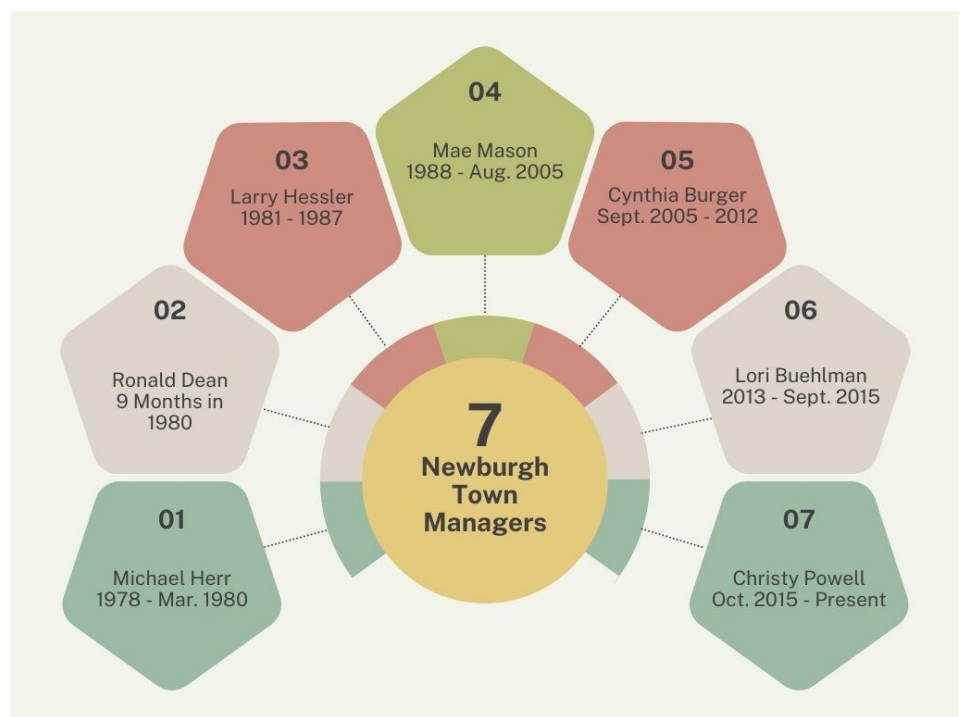
In 1978, the Newburgh Town Council hired their first Town Manager, Michael Herr. Before having a Town Manager, Town Council members were the ones that supervised and did the administrative duties for the Town. Michael Herr was quoted in the Evansville Press on March 2, 1978 stating "It was reasonable for the town board to foresee the need for a town manager. I think the town board realized it could not deliberate policies and at the same time try to legislate them." William Kavanaugh, Town Council President in 1978, was quoted in the minutes stating "The sole purpose of hiring a Town Manager is for better communication with the people of the town."

Since 1978 there has either been a Town Manager or a Town Administrative Manager. After Michael Herr left in March of 1980, Ronald Dean stepped in for the remainder of the year. In 1981, Larry Hessler took on the role of Town Manager and held the position for six (6) years.

In 1988, the Town Council made a motion to remove the title of Town Manager and replaced it with Town Administrative Manager. This new title gave Town Council more oversight in the decisions being made. Mae Mason was hired as the first Town Administrative Manager and held that role for the next seventeen (17) years. When Mae Mason retired in August of 2005, former Councilwoman Cynthia Burger was hired. Cynthia stepped down from her position as Councilperson and took the role of Town Administrative Manager. Cynthia held the Town Administrative Manager title for the next seven (7) years before retiring and the position going to Lori Buehlman. Lori became Town Administrative Manager in 2013 and resigned in September of 2015.

Christy Powell was hired to take on the position of Town Administrative Manager in 2015 and has been dedicated to that role since October 19th of that year. Coming up on eight (8) years with the Town of Newburgh, Christy has no plans on slowing down. Christy works hand in hand with Town Council but also works with Warrick Economic Development, Warrick County, Evansville MPO, INDOT, IDEM, and multiple other organizations for the interest of Newburgh residents, merchants, and visitors.

HOW TO DEAL WITH FALL LEAVES

Mulch the Leaves

Instead of raking the leaves, turn them into mulch. This will take less time and leaves make for excellent mulch. A spread of mulched leaves over a perennial bed provides insulation and improves soil quality as it decomposes. Like any mulch, you don't want to pile the leaves directly against shrub or tree trunks. Instead arrange them around stems like a donut, leaving some space around stems for airflow.

Compost the Leaves

Collect the leaves in a compost bin and let nature do the rest. The leaves will break down into soil that plants love.

Add to Trash Container

Leaves can be picked up on your regular trash pickup day, but must be placed within the trash container. No bags outside of the container will be picked up.

FALL LEAF PICKUP

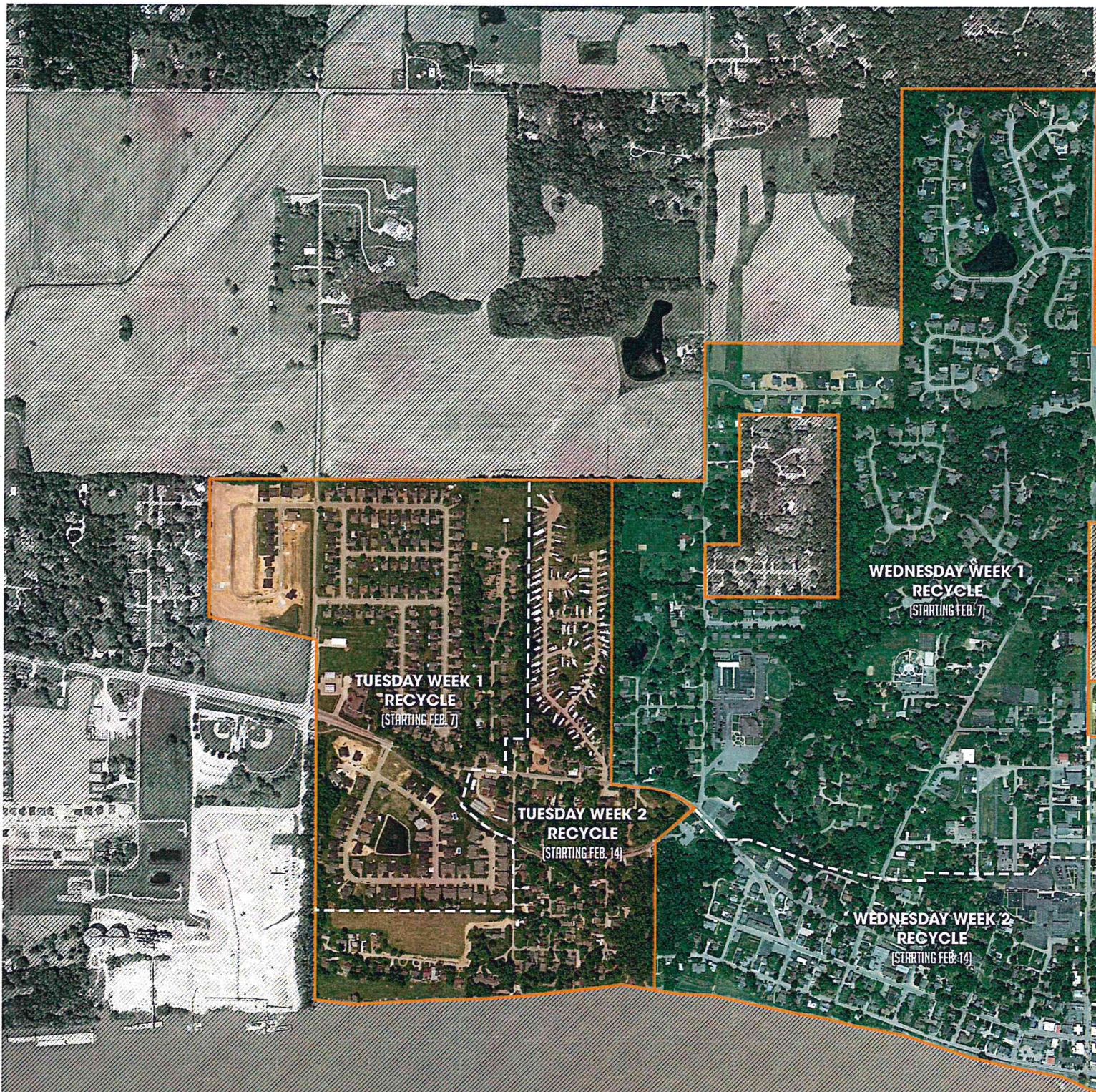
Councilwomen Allyson Shelby and Leanna Hughes, along with fellow Newburgh Trash Committee members, looked into multiple solutions for fall leaf pickup. After many back and forth conversations, Renewable Resources has agreed to contract out the fall leaf pickup for 2023.

In September, the Town of Newburgh released a Fall Leaf Pickup form on social media and the Town website. This form was to gather information on how many residences required fall leaf and/or Christmas tree pickup. The deadline for the form was September 30, 2023. Due to a small number of forms returned, we are extending the deadline to **October 27, 2023**. In order to be on the list for fall leaf and/or Christmas tree pickup you **MUST** fill out and submit the form to the Town of Newburgh. The form can be found on the Town website or you can contact ltemple@newburgh-in.gov for a copy of the form.

The first fall leaf pickup date is scheduled for November 10, 2023

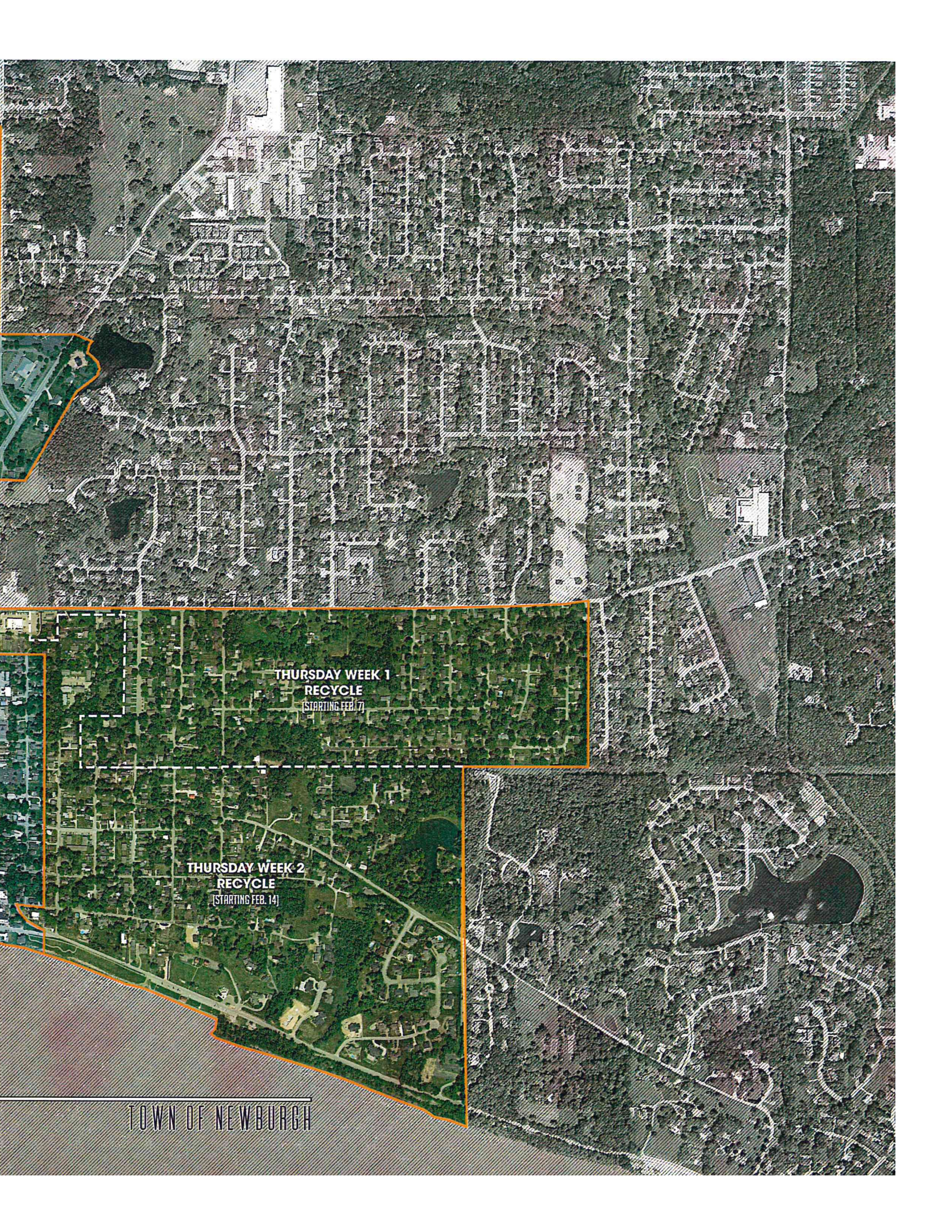
Renewable Resources will only pickup leaves from the households that submit a Fall Leaf form to the Town.

Councilmen and Stormwater Board Liaison, Steve Shoemaker, along with the Stormwater Board would like to inform residents on friendly car washing tips that can help protect our stormwater system.



When you wash your car in the driveway, pollutants from dirty water such as detergent, motor oil, gas and residue from exhaust fumes wash off cars and make their way into nearby storm drains. The pollutants flow through the storm drain system and drain into local creeks and rivers without going through treatment. These pollutants may end up harming fish and other wildlife.

Try a few of the following tips to help protect our creeks and river.

- Take your car to a commercial carwash. Most commercial car wash facilities recycle water or are connected to the sanitary sewer system that will treat dirty water.
- Wash your car on grass or a gravel surface to filter runoff.
- Consider using environmentally friendly products labeled “non-toxic”, “phosphate free”, and “biodegradable”.
- Conserve water by using a spray nozzle with an automatic shut off or shutting off the hose when not in use.
- Use a bucket of soapy water to re-soap rags or sponges throughout the wash rather than adding more soap directly to rags or sponges.
- Empty buckets of dirty wash water onto landscaped areas.
- If planning a car wash fundraiser, try developing a partnership with a commercial car wash facility or use a safe location.

STORM DRAINS



In 2017, storm drain markers were placed on all storm drains in the Town. These markers are to make everyone aware that what you put down these storm drains ends up in our waterways and could pollute the Ohio River.

The markers are a federally mandated minimum control measure that comply with MS4 requirements and enforced by IDEM (The Indiana Department of Environmental Management).

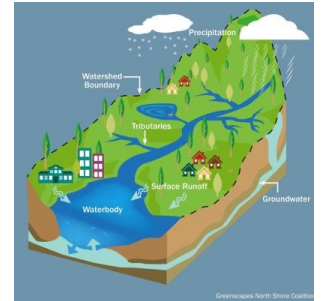
The storm drain markers are paid for by tax dollars and are property of the Town of Newburgh. They are not to be tampered with or illegally removed.

WHAT IS A WATERSHED?

A watershed is an area of land that drains to a common point such as a nearby creek, stream, river or lake. Every small watershed drains to a larger watershed that eventually flows to the ocean.



Watersheds support a wide variety of plants and wildlife and provide many outdoor recreation opportunities. By protecting the health of our watersheds we can preserve and enhance the quality of life for Newburgh area residents.

KEEPING LEAVES OUT OF STORM DRAINS



Stormwater Board Liaison, Steve Shoemaker, and Street Commissioner, Anne Rust Aurand, want to remind residents to keep leaves out of storm drains. Leaves in storm drains can cause trouble for homeowners, stormwater systems and water quality. The leaves can mat across the storm drain and block water flow, causing water to back up on the street. Storm drain backup is a common cause of lawn and basement flooding, which can occur repeatedly if not regularly cleaned.

Poor water quality is another example of the damage that leaves within a storm drain can cause. As the rain flows through the piles of leaves, phosphorous quickly leaches out of the leaves. Too much phosphorus in the water can lead to algae blooms, green and smelly water and can also lower the oxygen level in the water. Low oxygen in the water is bad for plants and animals that live in our streams and river.

While raking leaves in your yard, make sure to rake or blow leaves out of the street, especially before a storm. Storm drains are a crucial part of the stormwater system and it is important to keep them clear of leaves and other debris.

DRAINAGE DITCHES **A Homeowner's Responsibility**

Ditches located on your property are the property owner's responsibility to maintain. This includes keeping the ditch clear of trees, shrubs, weeds, rank vegetation, leaves, grass clippings and any non-stormwater discharge.

When drains are neglected and vegetation is allowed to grow, the drains are unable to do their job and allow proper drainage. Neglected drains can start to erode and lead to other problems on the property, neighboring properties and affect the whole drainage system.

Homeowners who do not keep the ditch clear of trees, shrubs, weeds or rank vegetation will be in violation of the Town of Newburgh Code of Ordinances §91.02 and could be fined.

In addition to keeping the ditch clear, discharging any non-stormwater discharge into the ditch is a direct violation of the Town of Newburgh Code of Ordinances §153.06 and can also lead to a fine. Stormwater pollution can also severely affect the whole drainage system, not just for you but your neighbors and the Town.

IS A BUILDING PERMIT **REQUIRED?**

The Newburgh Code of Ordinances § 157.049 (A)(1) states that "No building or other structure shall be erected, moved, relocated, added to or structurally altered, nor shall any building, structure or land be established or changed in use without first applying for and obtaining an improvement location permit."



Permits are required for the following:

- Change in use
- Location improvement
- Structural work having a value of \$1,000 or more
- Electrical work having a value of \$1,000 or more
- HVAC work having a value of \$1,000 or more
- Plumbing work having a value of \$1,000 or more
- Accessory buildings and structures to primary use
- Additions/alterations to existing structures
- Fences
- Manufactured homes
- Mobile homes
- Replacement windows
- Roof repair/replacement
- Siding/re-siding
- Signs
- Swimming pools
- Demolition
- Drainage

Please contact the Zoning Department prior to starting work to verify if a permit is required and if the contractor doing the work is a listed contractor within the Town.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Councilwoman and Board of Zoning Appeals Liaison, Anne Rust Aurand wants you to know that Code Enforcement is your trusted partner in maintaining the safety, integrity and livability of our town. The Town's mission is to protect public health, safety and welfare in all existing residential and nonresidential premises by proactively identifying and addressing potential hazards and code violations. The Town wishes to foster a collaborative atmosphere where we work together, with residents and businesses, to address concerns, provide guidance, and maintain open lines of communication.

The Town stays up-to-date with the latest codes, regulations and best practices and strives to conduct thorough inspections, respond to complaints, and offer guidance on compliance matters in a timely manner.

Examples of code enforcement may include, but are not limited to:

- Dangerous or substandard structures
- Maintenance of exterior of structures
- Junk, trash, abandoned vehicles and outside storage
- Weeds, grass and rank vegetation

If found in violation, the inspector will take photos of the violation and send a Notice of Violation letter to the owner of record giving them a minimum of ten (10) days to correct the violation. If the property remains in violation, enforcement action is taken. Enforcement action typically includes fines, public hearings ordering the correction or demolition of the property.

HISTORIC PROPERTY GRANT PROGRAMS

Newburgh Neighbor Residential Grant Program

The Newburgh Neighbor Residential Grant Program is a matching grant program that assists property owners in restoring and rehabilitating homes within the Newburgh Historic Districts. Grants are limited to exterior preservation, restoration, or rehabilitation of homes. Examples of work that would qualify include painting a house, repairing wooden windows, rebuilding a porch, repairing wood clapboard siding, and repairing or replacing doors. Grant funding is limited to owner-occupied residences and there is a \$2,000 grant fund maximum, with a \$1,000 owner match (2:1). For program guidelines and the application, visit the town website at www.newburgh-in.gov, select Historic Preservation from the stop bar and scroll down to Grants. Indiana Office of Community & Rural Affairs Historic Renovation Grant Program

Applicants with an eligible historic commercial structure have the opportunity to apply for project funding between \$5,000 and \$100,000 at a maximum request of 50 percent of the total eligible project cost. Eligible applicants include non-profits, individuals, partnerships, firms, associations, joint ventures, limited liability companies, corporation or non-profit affordable housing organization. DO YOU LIVE WITHIN A HISTORIC DISTRICT

Did you know that the Town of Newburgh has **FIVE HISTORIC DISTRICTS** and if you live within one of these five (5) historic districts, even if your home is not historic, you might need to get a Certificate of Appropriateness from the Historic Preservation Administrator before obtaining a building permit?

It is true! On February 22, 2017 Stacie Krieger, the Historic Preservation Liaison, brought forth a positive recommendation from the Historic Preservation Commission and the Newburgh Town Council approved the expansion of the historic district. The Historic Preservation Commission and Newburgh Town Council wanted to take the additional steps to preserve a greater number of historic properties and maintain the historic fabric of the Town. The best way to preserve and maintain these properties and areas was to expand the historic district, which expands the protection of historic Newburgh.

Any structures within the historic districts **DESIGNATED AS A HISTORIC STRUCTURE** (in the Indiana State Historic Architectural & Archaeological Research Database) will need to obtain a Certificate of Appropriateness for **ANY WORK** completed on the exterior of the structure that is visible from the public right of way.

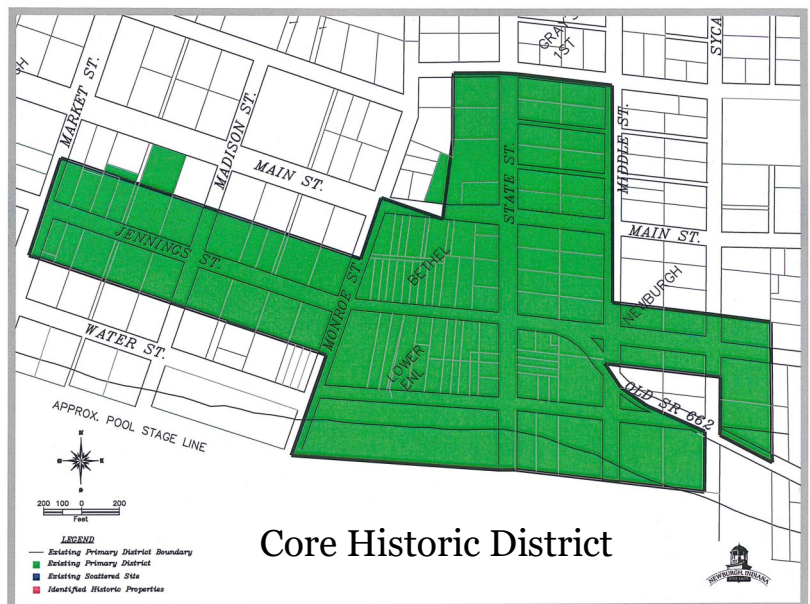
Any structures **NOT DESIGNATED AS HISTORIC** will have restrictions only related to the new construction, demolition, or moving of a structure.

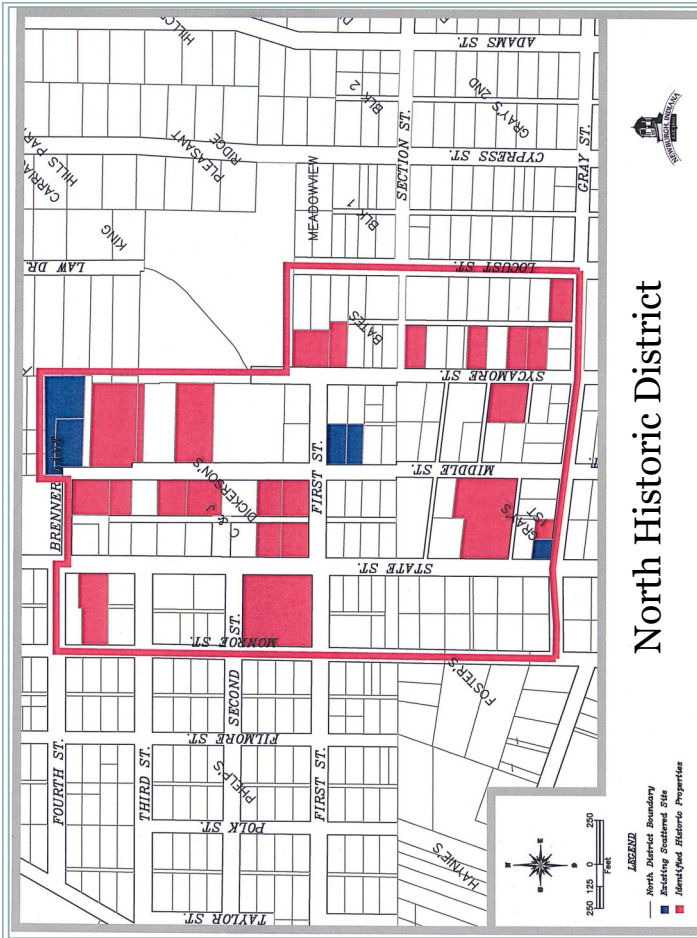

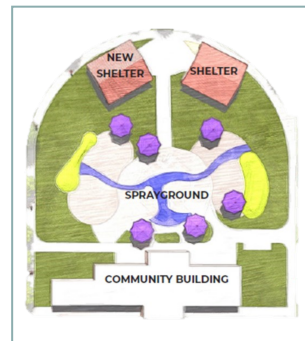


NEWBURGH PARKS AND RECREATION BOARD

LOU DENNIS COMMUNITY PARK

Newburgh Park Pals applied for and was awarded \$100,000 from Warrick County's American Rescue Plan Act Grant program. The \$100,000 will be used in conjunction with Town funding to start Phase III of the Lou Dennis Community Park Renovation.

Phase III will see the original shelter house razed, a new shelter house built to the west of the Kiwanis of Historic Newburgh shelter house, electricity ran to both shelter houses, landscaping updates, fencing and ADA accessible walkways added.



Construction will begin the beginning of October and due to safety concerns, the rental of the Kiwanis Shelter and Lou Room will be suspended until after construction is complete. The Fortress of Fun will remain open.

The Newburgh Parks and Recreation Board and Newburgh Town Council are excited for the updates as well as new plans being created by a firm contracted by Park Pals. These new plans will replace the existing park master plan, but will go into more detail on the next phases, which include reimagining the Fortress of Fun and adding additional play features. Thank you to Newburgh Park Pals for all the work you do, not just for Lou Dennis Community Park, but for the other six parks located within the Newburgh Park System.

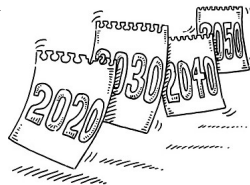

OPEN BURNING PROHIBITED

Councilwoman Leanna Hughes would like to remind everyone per Newburgh Code of Ordinances §92.02, no person, firm or corporation shall openly burn any material within the Town except as allowed by the following exceptions:

Open burning of wood products, except leaves, shall be allowed for the following:

- Twelfth Night ceremonies
- School Pep Rallies
- Fires used for cooking purposes
- Riverbank campfires
- Fires used in scouting activities
- Fires for purposes of fire training by a Fire Department
- Riverbank driftwood burning
- Upon permit from the Town Council

Open burning of non-wood products shall only be allowed by permit.

Otherwise, non-permitted open burning may be allowed by special permit by Town Council upon conditions established by Town Council and payment of a special permit fee.

SIGNS WITHIN THE PUBLIC RIGHT OF WAY



Pursuant to Indiana Code 9-21-4-6 and the Newburgh Code of Ordinances Section 157.196 private signs, including political signs, are prohibited in the public right of-way. Please note that signs placed within the public right of way may be removed by the Town staff without prior notice. Town personnel generally remove signs from the right of way as they are encountered in normal street maintenance activities. Removed signs will be taken to the Town Maintenance Facility located at 300 W. First Street (corner of First and Polk Street), where they can be picked up.

BUILDING SIGNAGE

Councilwoman and Sign Committee member, Leanna Hughes, wants to remind residents that Newburgh Code of Ordinance §157.98 states that no person may erect, alter or relocate any banner, wall sign, ground sign, permanent window sign, canopy or awning in the Town without first obtaining a permit from the Zoning Administrator.



Town of Newburgh Winter Snow Event Guidelines

As the winter season approaches and the possibility of winter snow storms increase, Street Commissioner, Anne Rust Aurand, wants to remind residents of the Town of Newburgh's approach to snow removal for the 2023-2024 winter season.

Please take caution during any snow storm. If at all possible, please remain home when it is still snowing outside. During snow cleanup operations, the Town of Newburgh snow plows will inadvertently push snow onto sidewalks. This is unavoidable and it is the responsibility of the adjacent residential or business owner to remove these snow berms from the sidewalks. Residents should try to get their vehicles off the streets until the Town crew have had a chance to clear the streets.

Streets

Street plowing operations are performed in the following order:

1. Major snow routes
2. Start salting all hills and intersections
3. Secondary Streets
4. Widen roads to full street capacity

The Town does NOT plow alleys

Snow removal crews work long hours to keep the streets clear and safe. We ask for everyone's cooperation to help keep streets safe as well. Remember, snowplow trucks cannot stop or turn as readily as most vehicles.

It should not be expected that streets would immediately be clear to pavement. A mixture of sun, sand and traffic is utilized to help with the de-icing process. Some snow is left on the street after plowing because allowances must be made for manhole lids and other above pavement obstacles to avoid damaging snow plow blades.

When plowing is required, snow berms are created across driveways. The plow operators do not have control over the berms of snow coming off the edge of the blade. The Street Department tries to keep this problem to a minimum.



Shoveling Recommendations

The following are shoveling recommendations for residents and commercial property owners.



- Commercial property owners are responsible for plowing commercial parking lots, driveways and public sidewalks adjoining their businesses.
- Residential property owners are responsible for shoveling or plowing public sidewalks adjoining their homes.
- For safety, snow should not be shoveled or plowed into the street.
- Shovel out fire hydrants that are in or around your property and around meters to aid utility meter readers.
- Uncover your mailbox and create a path for postal vehicles to pull up to mailboxes.
- Help your neighbors. For many residents, age or medical conditions make it difficult to shovel snow.

During Snowfall Events

The Town of Newburgh will mobilize its Street Department when there is a measurable accumulation of snowfall or if the winter mix is causing a hazardous driving situation such as freezing rain. The Street Department is responsible for around 22 miles of roadway with a fleet of 4 snow plows and a crew of 4 employees. The Street Crew rotates on a 2-man crew until all streets are cleared.

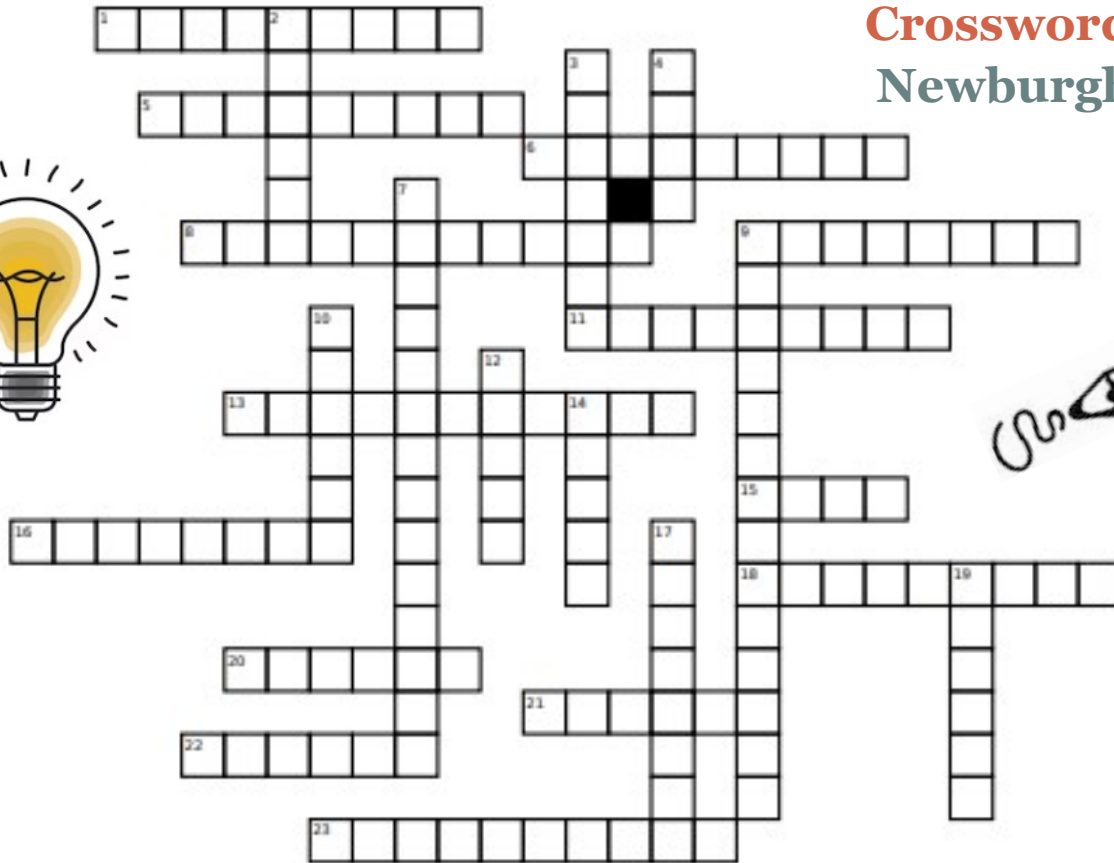
Report an Issue—The Town of Newburgh makes every effort to clear the roads from curb to curb where cars are not parked on the street. In some situations, the snow plow may damage/remove mailboxes that are set close to the street or damage the street itself. This is unavoidable. Mailbox, sod damage or road damage complaints will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis.

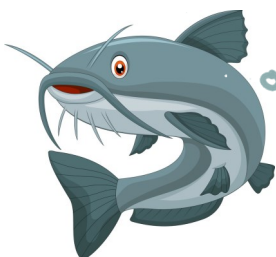
